# WHAT IS ADULT EDUCATION?

Our mission is to empower individuals to become self-sufficient, with skills necessary for future employment and personal successes.

Our vision is to assist adults to become literate and obtain the knowledge and skills necessary for employment and self-sufficiency while completing a secondary education.

For 43 years the Utah State Office of Education Adult Education Services has had a positive impact on the economic development of Utah.


Adult Education in Utah consist of programs and services to assist individuals 16 years of age and older who have discontinued public educa-

tion enrollment or whose high school class has graduated and who do not have a high school diploma. Adults needing English language acquisition and those with or without a high school diploma needing basic skills development are also eligible.



**Utah Adult Education promotes** programs in Adult Basic Education (ABE), Adult High School Completion (AHSC), English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), and General Education Development (GED®). Programs may emphasize English language acquisition and competency, basic skills in reading, writing, math and problem solving, or workplace literacy in addition to academic/credit courses leading to high school completion.

Adult Education programs are located in 40 school districts and several community and/or faith based organizations. Individual businesses have chosen to provide adult education services as part of their employee advancement process.



Education pays in higher earnings and lower unemployment rates.

#### **Economic Impact**

- Workers who lack a high school diploma/GED® earn a median weekly income of \$451 compared to \$638 with a high school diploma/GED® and compared to \$1,053 for those with a bachelor's degree.
- Graduating from high school/getting a GED<sup>®</sup> increases the likelihood of avoiding welfare by 75%.
- Literate adults are crucial to the development of schoolready and literate children.
- Each adult high school diploma and GED<sup>®</sup> generates nearly \$800 in state income taxes annually.

# ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMS


#### Adult Basic Education (ABE)

ABE programs provide instruction for adults whose ability to compute, speak, read, or write the English language only at or below the ninth grade level impairs their ability to find or retain employment commensurate with their real ability. Instruction in designed to help adults by:

- Increasing their independence.
- Increasing opportunities for more productive and profitable employment.
- Making them better able to meet adult responsibilities.

# Adult High School Completion (AHSC)

AHSC programs are for those adults with some literacy skills and can function in everyday life, but do not have a secondary school diploma or GED<sup>®</sup>. AHSC courses are designed to meet the Utah State Office of Education Core Curriculum and offer Carnegie-based credit for a secondary diploma.




# English Language Civics (ELC) and English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL)

ELC/ESOL programs provide instruction for those limited English proficient students who have a focus on improving English communication skills such as speaking, reading, writing, and listening.

#### Corrections Education


Corrections Education provides educational opportunities to adults located in state prisons and jails. Programs include ABE, AHSC, and GED<sup>®</sup>. Additional services include employment counseling and career exploration. Transition services to other adult education programs are available before and after release.





# General Educational Development (GED®)


GED<sup>®</sup> measures the major and lasting outcomes and concepts associated with a traditional four-year high school education. GED<sup>®</sup> preparation programs are offered by adult education programs although attendance is not necessary to take the test. Testing sites are located statewide.










# **Utah Adult Education Demographics**

- 21,005 Enrollees

# THE NEED FOR ADULT EDUCATION SERVICES

- 191,311 adults in Utah do not have a high school diploma or  $GED^{\mathbb{R}}$  (2000 Census).
- 30% of the Dept. of Workforce Services' (among 10,172 in case management with an academic assessment) disclosed education levels less than a high school diploma or  $GED^{\otimes}$ .
- 14,931 Utahns (among the current population, 38,597) receiving unemployment insurance benefits indicate they do not have a high school diploma or  $GED^{\mathbb{R}}$ .
- ullet 8% of all Utah birth mothers do not have a high school diploma or  $\mathbf{GED}^{ ext{ iny B}}$
- Approximately 265,800 Utahns are on public assistance.
- Approximately 12,000 Utahns are housed in correctional facilities.
- Approximately 38,597 are receiving unemployment compensation.

# BARRIERS WITHOUT ADULT EDUCATION

- Low literacy rate
- Not self-sufficient
- Unable to apply for entrance into the military
- Unable to apply for post-secondary training
- Unemployment or minimum-wage jobs
