Board Amends Guidance on Sensitive Materials in School

Libraries

The Utah State Board of Education amended R277-628, Sensitive Materials, previously

titled School Libraries, to align the Board's guidance on sensitive materials in school

libraries with the requirements of HB 29, Sensitive Material Review Amendments,

passed during the 2024 legislative session. Changes include the addition of an oversight

category designation, updated LEA policy requirements, and a reporting and compliance

section to the rule. Additionally, removal of any material will require notification to parents

via a school-related communication platform.

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Board Asks Legislature to Consider Applying State Sovereignty Law to Title IX Regulations, Allocates \$100,000 to Better Understand Impact

The Utah State Board of Education (USBE) allocated \$100,000 in discretionary funds to better understand how recent changes to <u>Title IX</u> regulations might impact public schools within the State of Utah. The U.S. Department of Education released updated regulations related to Title IX in April which are set to become law on August 1, 2024. To better understand how these new regulations will impact schools in Utah, the Board:

- Allocated \$50,000 in discretionary funds for a contract attorney to assist USBE's AAGs in evaluating if and how state law is out of compliance with federal law in light of the new Title IX regulations, with a mid-July deadline.
- Requested that the legislature consider the application of <u>SB 57, Utah</u>
 <u>Constitutional Sovereignty Act</u>, passed during the 2024 legislative session, to the Title IX regulations, including potential indemnification, if needed.
- 3. Allocated an additional \$50,000 in discretionary funds to retain an independent auditor to conduct an audit and provide findings to the Board to determine all federal funds received by USBE for 2022, 2023, and 2024, and to evaluate USBE's direct and indirect costs as an agency by itemizing the total USBE compliance costs associated with each federal law, order, and regulation, using data for 2022, 2023, and 2024.

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Board Approves Waiver Requests from Wayne and Garfield Counties

The Utah State Board of Education approved a <u>waiver request</u> from Wayne County school district that would allow the schools to move to a four-day school week. Hanksville Elementary, Loa Elementary, and Wayne High School have requested this waiver from <u>R277-419(4)</u>, which states that an LEA shall provide educational services over a minimum of 180 school days each school year.

The Board also approved a waiver renewal request from <u>Garfield County School District</u> that would allow the continuation of their four-day school week schedule.

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Board Consolidates Existing Student Data Advisory Groups into a Student Data Protection Advisory Group

In accordance with the legislation, the Board repealed Board Policy 5004, Student Data User Advisory Group and Board Policy 5005, Student Data Governance Advisory Group.

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Board Directs Staff to Create Legislative Funding Requests

The Utah State Board of Education will begin to prepare <u>legislative funding requests for</u> <u>the 2025 General Session</u>. Requests will be related to:

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Board Approves Uniform Base Funding for Charter

Schools with Fewer than 2,000 Students for FY25

The Utah State Board of Education approved a set, uniform base amount for charter schools with fewer than 2,000 students or \$115 per student, whichever is greater. Additionally, the Board allocated \$200,560 to charters with more than 2,000 students for the FY25 Charter Base Funding Program. These amounts will be one-time, for FY25 only. The Charter Base Funding Program provides funding to certain charter schools to support base operating functions, including data reporting, administrative costs, etc. This will provide a temporary, one-time funding solution for smaller charter schools while discussions continue about a longer term solution.

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Board Approves Increase in Amount of Liquor Tax Funds

to be Used for CNP Administrative Costs

The Utah State Board of Education (USBE) approved the increase of liquor tax funds from \$1 million to up to 4 percent of total liquor tax collections per year for USBE

administrative costs. Child Nutrition Program (CNP) costs have been rising, but the

funding CNP has been receiving from USDA State Administrative expenses has

decreased over the past two years, which has made it difficult for CNP to run its current

program efficiently and at the current level of service to districts and charters. This

increase in liquor tax funds used will help cover the increase in administrative costs. By

increasing the amount of liquor tax funds used, districts and charters will only

experience a decrease of \$.02 per meal. The funds requested will positively impact

each of the objectives in the CNP strategic plan, which was developed to ensure CNP

supports the mission of USBE.

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New Administrative Rules, Amendments, and Repeals

The Utah State Board of Education approved, amended, or repealed the following administrative rules:

- R277-710, Intergenerational Poverty Interventions in Public Schools. This rule is being repealed upon its five-year review and following the passage of SB 2.
- R277-126, Utah Fits All Scholarship. This rule is being repealed following the passage of HB 529 to reflect the legislative changes to the program.
- R277-629, Paid Professional Hours for Educators. This rule is being amended to add the oversight category, add a policy requirement for LEAs, and clarify what program funds may be used for.
- R277-800, Utah Schools of the Deaf and Blind. This rule is being amended to add an oversight category, strike a budgetary carry-forward limitation, and provide an opportunity for hearing siblings to attend the School for the Deaf.
- R277-926, Certification of Residential Treatment Center Special Education Program. This rule is being continued upon its five-year review.
- R277-331, Stipends for Future Educators. This rule is being created to set the stipend amount and other program rules consistent with HB 221.
- R277-322, Local Education Agency (LEA) Codes of Conduct. This rule is being continued upon its five-year review and updated to include an oversight category.
- R277-304, General Teacher Preparation Competencies. This document is being updated after a legal analysis that ensures it is in compliance with legislation. The Board also approved incorporating the updated competencies into the rule.
- R277-628, School Libraries. This rule is being amended following the passage of <u>HB 29</u> and will now include an oversight category designation, updated LEA policy requirements, and a reporting and compliance section.
- R277-407, School Fees. This rule is being amended following the passage of <u>HB</u> 415.
- R277-408, School Fundraising. This rule is being created due to the passage of <u>HB 82</u>, which separated revenue raised through fundraising from the definition of school fees. Portions of R277-407 will be repealed and moved into this new rule.
- R277-113, LEA Fiscal and Auditing Policies. This rule is being amended to align with HB 415 and HB 82.
- R277-459, Teacher Supplies and Materials Appropriation. This rule is being amended to clarify in rule that only classroom teachers should be included.

- R277-726, Statewide Online Education Program (SOEP). This rule is being amended to update definitions and clarify staff responsibilities for approving new providers following the passage of <u>HB 247</u>.
- R277-326, Early Learning. This rule is being amended to add an oversight category and remove the restriction that requires LEAs to use all grant funds in the year the funds are distributed.
- R277-332, Master Pilot Program Grant Application Scoring Rubric (Incorporated by Reference Document). This rule is being created due to the passage of <u>HB</u> 431.
- R277-332, Teacher Retention Pilot Program. This rule is being created due to the passage of <u>HB 431</u>.
- R277-436, Gang Prevention and Intervention Programs in the Schools. This rule
 is being amended to include updated legal requirements to ensure that schools
 are cooperating with local law enforcement and community prevention providers,
 and using the data collected by multiple state agencies to make data informed
 decisions about programming for juvenile gang prevention and intervention.
- R277-475, Patriotic, Civic and Character Education. This rule is being continued upon its five-year review.
- R277-730, Kindergarten Programs. This rule is being created to define half-day kindergarten options and half-day kindergarten class requirements.
