Special Populations Best Practice – Single Parents

As we continue to highlight evidence-based practices, this month we highlight the special population of single parents. Career Technical Education (CTE) policies and programs have increasingly focused on supporting the needs of historically marginalized learners and closing access and performance gaps among learner groups. Single parents, including single pregnant women, have been identified within CTE as a population of interest since 1984.

In these evidence-based practices, here are several items to remember:

- Do not isolate teen parents in separate programs where access to CTE is not available. Access to CTE programs that lead to employment in an occupation with family-sustaining wages is critical.
- Allow for attendance flexibility and alternative course completion options, especially for teen parents who may be struggling to manage parenting responsibilities.
- Identify transportation opportunities for the teen parent's child to childcare and the student to school, ideally in the same location.



Supporting Single Parents in Career Technical Education

- Provide parenting/child development classes for teen parents to develop coping skills and stay in school.
- Help single parents develop skills to balance work/family/school/life and build financial literacy by integrating these skills into the curriculum and supplementing with workshops, online training, and newsletter content.
