The Family and Community Engagement section at USBE has created this newsletter to connect with you and your


families to help build a community for all of you to share ideas, and inspiration that help meet the needs of your families and students. Our goal is that we will be able to be systems of supports for each other.

Promising Practices: Esperanza Elementary

In Spanish, the word Esperanza means hope; at Esperanza Elementary, hope comes to life. Walking into the hidden treasure behind a restaurant and bank in West Valley, I was greeted by a welcoming receptionist. As I chuckled at the posted sign, "Does your teacher know you're here?" I was invited to Principal Alejandre's office.

Meeting with the Principal who resides and has previously worked in Ogden, it was clear to me that this was a professional fully committed to their life's work and a legacy of dignity and empowerment for students, families, and all of the other professionals in the building.

"Treat every child with dignity and respect first," says Principal Alejandre as he explains how every child and family is greeted by staff at drop-off every morning. Leadership staff participates in these daily rituals. Administrative presence is one factor stated by families as something they need more of to know that they belong and are being heard.

Key Take-aways from Esperanza Elementary

- Support family well-being: Build on student interest (Mariachi classes) and support the advancement of families (citizenship classes) with the help of local partners.
- Leave the door open: Offer dignity to all. Is someone late? Thank them
 for coming. Are families not engaging? Complete your duties to the
 highest standard consistently regardless. Continue to communicate and
 show up. It is okay to step away from the professional self and meet
 families through a personal lens. We are more than our professional titles.
- Be intentional: Support your paraprofessionals and prioritize best practices in your plan for the year. Esperanza has "grown their own teachers" by providing financial support for their educational growth and has budgeted for family engagement events including home visits outside of grants to ensure the sustainability of these programs first. What you prioritize will ripple into other goals.
