

1 **R277. Education, Administration.**

2 **R277-618. Homeless Teen Center Grant Program.**

3 **R277-618-1. Authority and Purpose.**

4 (1) This rule is authorized by:

5 (a) Utah Constitution Article X, Section 3, which vests general control and
6 supervision over public education in the Board;

7 (b) Section 53E-3-401(4), which allows the Board to make rules to execute the
8 Board's duties and responsibilities under the Utah Constitution and state law.

9 (2) The purpose of this rule is to provide:

10 (a) the criteria for ranking applications for a homeless teen center grant;

11 (b) the funding limit and allowable uses; and

12 (c) the required data collection for measuring success of the grant.

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14 **R277-618-2. Definitions.**

15 (1) "Family service worker" or "FSW" means a school employee who connects
16 families and parents with the resources needed to self-sustain and thrive, including:

17 (a) identify physical and emotional self-care;

18 (b) stress-coping mechanisms; and

19 (c) advocate for the family's needs.

20 (2) "Free application for student federal aid" or "FASFA" means the official form
21 to apply for federal financial aid to pay for college provided by the Department of
22 Education.

23 (3) "Wrap-around services" means services that bring families, providers, and
24 key members of the family's social support network together to collaborate to build a
25 customized plan of care that responds to the unique needs of the child and family.

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27 **R277-618-3. Application and Scoring Criteria.**

28 (1) Subject to legislative appropriation, an LEA may apply for the homeless teen
29 center grant.

30 (2) An LEA's application shall include the following:

31 (a) capacity of the LEA to staff the center with a FSW that will provide
32 wrap-around services for the students;

33 (b) ability to provide homeless students with assistance, guidance, and
34 connection to necessary resources;

35 (c) the ability to provide the services within the center, including:

36 (i) a food pantry that is community-based allowing access to food services;

37 (ii) showers and hygiene necessities;

38 (iii) laundry facilities, including a washer and dryer;

39 (iv) academic counseling and advisement, including:

40 (A) FAFSA applications for grants and loans; and

41 (B) work study funds available at universities and tech colleges;

42 (v) collaboration with district and county agencies for mental, dental, medical and
43 vision services;

44 (vi) mindfulness and social and emotional resources, including access to a FSW;

45 (vii) [availability to connect with spiritual and religious resources](#); and

46 (viii) collaboration with a local tech college for technical job training prior to
47 graduation;

48 (d) readiness of facilities to house a homeless teen center at a school campus,
49 including general construction plans, if required;

50 (e) demonstrated need for a homeless teen center, including:

51 (i) homeless teen population within the LEA, including recent population trends;

52 (ii) lack of existing infrastructure or resources to service current population
53 needs;

54 (iii) other quantitative or qualitative data that demonstrate overall need;

55 (f) a budget outlining the intended use of the grant funds;

56 (g) a timeline for achieving an operational homeless teen center; and

57 (h) ability to maintain and keep the homeless teen center operational over time.

58 (3) An LEA shall apply for the grant in a form and within the deadlines specified
59 by the Superintendent.

60 (4) An LEA's application shall be scored and ranked by the Superintendent
61 based upon the overall:

62 (a) demonstrated need for a homeless teen center;

63 (b) quality of the budget proposal and timeline as described in Subsection (2);

64 and

65 (c) capacity to maintain an operational homeless teen center, as described in
66 Subsection (2).

67 (5) The Superintendent shall select and notify grant awardees within 30 days of
68 the application deadline.

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70 **R277-618-4. Funding and Measurements of Success.**

71 (1) A grant awardee may not receive more than \$250,000 for an approved
72 application and all awards are reimbursement based.

73 (2) A grant awardee shall submit for reimbursement in a form and timeline
74 determined by the Superintendent.

75 (3) A grant awardee may only be reimbursed for expenditures outlined within the
76 grant awardee's budget submitted as part of the application described in R277-618-3(2).

77 (4) A grant awardee may seek a budget variance from the Superintendent if the
78 variance is sought prior to the expenditure of funds for the variance.

79 (5) The Superintendent shall review and approve or deny a variance request
80 within 30 days of receiving the request.

81 (6) A grant awardee shall collect the following data to measure success of the
82 homeless teen center:

83 (a) the projected number of students experiencing homelessness that are served
84 by the homeless teen center annually;

85 (b) evidence of a match of a 0.5 full time equivalent funding for a teen center
86 coordinator within the LEA or school campus hosting the homeless teen center;

87 (c) participation of community partners, including:

88 (i) local food bank;

89 (ii) local health authority; and

90 (iii) other community-based organizations [including religious faith-based services](#)
91 [and non-sectarian social services](#); and

92 (d) annual attendance data of the students served by the homeless teen center.

93 (7) A grant awardee shall provide the data described in Subsection (5) to the
94 Superintendent upon request.
