PARENT ORIENTATION: IN A NUTSHELL

- Students with parents who understand the culture and expectations of a school, irrespective of their income or background, are more likely to have higher grades and test scores, attend school regularly, have better social skills and show improved behaviour.²
- o **Teacher parent communication** is crucial to the **overall wellbeing** of the child. if these are established in the early stages of the students enrolment, teachers are often cited as valuable partners for parents later on for academic as well as non-academic issues.³
- Student graduation between KeyStages can pose as a challenge as well as an opportunity to involve parents in the process of the transition. Schools that focus on the new relationship between teacher-students as well as teacher-parent make successful adjustments to social, procedural and academic outcomes.⁴
