

Juvenile Gang Prevention Grant for the current year (FY25) and two subsequent years (FY26 & FY27)

Overview:

During the 2024 General Legislative Session, HB 362 Juvenile Justice Revisions (2024) updated Utah code 53F-2-410 Juvenile Gang and Other Violent Crime Prevention and Intervention Grant funding (hereafter referred to as Juvenile Gang Prevention Grant) to incorporate changes to the statute. The statute now requires LEA that is seeking this funding to submit a proposal that (i) describes how the school district or charter school intends to use the funds and (ii) provides data related to the prevalence of crimes committed by minors within the school district in order to receive the funding. In addition, LEA must collaborate with local law enforcement and community prevention to address juvenile gang and other violent crimes. Accordingly, the Utah State Board of Education's (USBE) has updated and approved Board Rule R277-436 on June 6, 2024 meeting (the link to the final document is pending). This grant application has been developed to meet the new statutory requirements, and the grant is being managed by the USBE Prevention Team.

The Prevention Team supports Local Education Agencies (LEAs, meaning districts and charters) in implementing a student-focused, evidence-informed, data-driven approach for all prevention work, in order to promote the knowledge and skills necessary for students to be successful in life and have meaningful engagement with their community. Through a <u>protective factors</u> <u>framework</u>, the Prevention and Student Services Programs provide resources and supports to reduce the risks of absenteeism, bullying, child abuse, gangs, human trafficking, school dropout, substance use, and suicide. In collaboration with community partners and other stakeholders, these supports are built on a foundation of family engagement, trauma-informed care, and restorative practices.

For the Juvenile Gang Prevention grant to be effective, it is highly recommended that LEAs be familiar with the <u>implementation science model</u>, as well as <u>the protective factor framework</u>. LEAs should consider incorporating these frameworks into their programs and work with students, and request technical assistance from the Prevention and Student Services Teams when needed.

Requirement/Qualification

- 1. The competitive grant is open to all LEAs across the state.
- 2. As stated in the updated USBE <u>Administrative Rule R277-436</u> (link to approved Board rule is pending), LEAs will provide the following information in order to apply for the grant funds:
 - a) How the LEA will identify the targeted student population;
 - b) How the prevention and intervention strategies implemented will benefit the target student population;
 - c) What prevention and intervention activities and strategies the LEA will use to address identified issues;
 - d) How the LEA will collaborate with local law enforcement agencies and community prevention providers; and
 - e) How an LEA plans to use the Juvenile Gang Prevention grant funds.
- 3. Priority will be given to applicants that:
 - a) Demonstrate collaborative efforts with local law enforcement agencies and community prevention providers;
 - b) Use state agency data as defined in Subsections 53F-2-410 (4)(a)(i) and 53F-2-410(3)(a)(i) that demonstrate multiple risk factors for gang involvement;
 - c) Define how the LEA will implement activities funded by the grant to increase protective factors for students at risk of gang involvement; and
 - d) Use data to evaluate that the activities implemented are successful and that gang involvement is reduced from previous years.

Instructions

- 1. Review Utah code <u>53F-2-410</u> Juvenile Gang and Other Violent Crime Prevention and Intervention Grant.
- 2. Review the <u>Board Rule 277-436</u> (link to the approved Board rule is pending) Juvenile Gang and other Violent Crime Prevention and Intervention Grant.
- 3. Review and complete the Juvenile Gang Prevention Grant Application
- 4. Submit the application by August 30, 2024.

Please note that the award for each subsequent year is dependent on the funding appropriated by the legislature and on LEA's compliance with statute, rule, and the grant terms. The three-year cycle will end on June 30, 2027.
